Abstract: According to Juan Linz, the 20th century can be called both the century of totalitarianism and the century of democracy: The century saw the birth of the most oppressive political systems in history and the eruption of violence and terror on an unprecedented scale, as well as the collapse of totalitarian and authoritarian regimes, decolonization and the blossoming of democracy on an unprecedented scale. For the 21st century it is already apparent that the old debate about the concept of totalitarianism and its explanatory power is again becoming relevant. The presentation will briefly trace the evolution of this concept starting from the Second World War and then discuss the criticism of the concept and try to explain why this concept is still important and worthy of further conceptualization.

**Krystian Wiciarz** is head of The Center for Totalitarian Studies at the Pilecki Institute in Warsaw. Political scientist and philosopher, specialist in management. Working on social and political change, political systems, political theory and political thought.
